
Reflections on solidarity visit to Palestine November 2024

Israel/Palestine



We only visited Israel once when we went to Sderot. Everywhere else was in occupied territory.

Almost every hilltop has an illegal settlement on it. Some are small ones and others such as **Har Homa**, overlooking Bethlehem, are huge cities.





The **settlement infrastructure** includes **bypass roads**, which are designed to allow Israeli settlers to travel between settlements without interacting with or even seeing Palestinian communities. These roads, along with other forms of infrastructure like **electricity, internet, and military installations**, are being built on Palestinian lands.





A so-called agricultural gate for the Palestinians to access their land. It is rarely open and never for long enough.



The Israeli flyover avoids all contact or even sight of the Palestinians

Al Makhrour valley, UNESCO-recognised, near Bethlehem.

One of the last two remaining green and recreational spaces left for Palestinians.

A small illegal settlement sits in the middle of it. A Palestinian family and business were expelled.

The area is under imminent threat of being annexed, therefore exclusively for Israelis.





The entrance to the Jordan river and the baptismal site of Jesus. Closed for no apparent reason.

Inconvenient for us, but for Palestinians, long journeys on potholed narrow roads, leading to loss of time, extra petrol, and severe wear and tear on vehicles.



Typical red or yellow gate, installed and often closed by Israel, preventing Palestinians from easily accessing their village or land



You can see the winding rough back roads that Palestinians are forced to take.

Israeli roads widened by taking more Palestinian land.

Palestinians forced to drive on old potholed, narrow roads to access their own homes and land






Bethlehem

Wi'am , Conflict Transformation Centre next to wall. Israeli's calls the wall a security barrier. Palestinians call it the annexation wall, because 85% of it is built inside the West Bank taking more land

This area of Bethlehem is one of the most teargassed areas in the world.

The Israeli military also use skunk water—a disgusting foul-smelling liquid, which is spayed on and clings to, skin, clothes, buildings, cars, and homes. The smell lingers for days and gets worse when washed with water. It is claimed to be chemical-free, but the lingering smell and its ability to trigger alarms at checkpoints or airports suggest otherwise.

Many olives not picked.






Multiple locks to undo before entering the **Tent of Nations**, southwest of Bethlehem

Never granted planning permission by Israel.

Only demolition orders for structures including for water storage.

Caves used for accommodation and meeting rooms.



The Tent of Nations has had a long running battle in the Israeli courts to keep their land. For which they have documents dating back to Ottoman times

Over the years their fruit trees have been bulldozed by Israeli forces, and they have suffered many incursions from Israeli settlers.






Illegal settlement school built adjacent to the property.

A very dirty nappy thrown down from the settlement






Wire mesh to protect the Palestinians from the settlers who throw all sorts of nasty things down




Shuhada Street, closed to Palestinians.

On 18 February, Armenian activists launched a legal case based on documents dating back more than 400 years showing the land was held in trust for the community

Remains of a blockade set up by young members of the church who camped out here when settlers turned up with bulldozers.






Broken plug socket

As we travelled towards the border with Gaza, yellow chairs at the side of the road with the pictures and names of the hostages on them.



We visited **UNWRA** in Jerusalem and heard about Israeli actions against them

3 new Bills had been passed in the Knesset

- To designate them a terrorist organisation along with other human rights organisations and NGOs
- To rescind all their privileges
- To stop all their operations in areas controlled by Israel including Area C of the West Bank (60%), East Jerusalem and Gaza.

Although Israel cannot end their mandate, because Israel did not create their mandate, It intends to impose a ‘no contact’ policy between UNWRA and Israel or with those presently co-ordinating with them.

If implemented, this will :

- Prevent UNWRA from any operations in the West Bank or Gaza.
- Prevents access to 3 million Dollars in an Israeli bank
- Prevent them from getting insurance on or maintenance of vehicles
